Catalog Description and Student Learning Outcomes: A survey of United States history from the earliest European settlements in North America through the end of Reconstruction (1877). Emphasizes U.S. political, economic, and social development the evolution of its institutions, and the causes and consequences of its principal wars. At the end of the course students should be able to:

- Explain the causes and significance of the American Revolution and the Civil War
- Compare and evaluate various sources of history
- Critique historical assertions made by others

Technology Applications

Turnitin: Papers must be submitted via the course's turnitin account. You will need to create an account at turnitin.com. This is free and easy; if you have problems, please contact the instructor. You will need the course number and password. The course # is **18699958**; the password is **history**.

Note that any assignment with a turnitin originality score over 20% will receive a 0 grade and might result in other action.

E-Reserves: Course materials – syllabus, readings, etc. will be posted on the course's MVSU E-Reserves page, which can be accessed through the MVSU Library website. More details are on the first-day handout.

YouTube: You will be asked to watch a number of videos. They can be found by searching for the title on Youtube.

Attendance: While coming to class is no guarantee that a student will do well, evidence strongly suggests that students who attend regularly do better than those who do not. Therefore, every second unexcused absence after the second will result in the lowering of the final course grade by one letter grade; i.e. 4 unexcused absences = 1 letter grade deduction, 6 unexcused absences = 2 letter grade deduction, etc. Excused absences, whether school related or personal, will require documentation.

Attendance will be taken at the beginning of class; students more than 10 minutes tardy will be counted absent though they are, of course, encouraged to attend.

Classroom Behavior and Expectations: Students are expected to conduct themselves in a proper manner. This includes showing respect for themselves, their classmates, and the instructor. Inappropriate behavior will not be tolerated. This includes: eating, texting, wearing headphones, disrespectful behavior toward any class member, taking phone calls, leaving the classroom without permission, talking, sleeping, or leaving class early. The main expectation is that you come to class prepared and actively engage in your own education. This means doing the reading before class, turning in assignments on time, and asking questions when things are unclear.

Email: I check my email daily during the work week, and will always reply. If you do not receive a reply within a day, chances are I did not receive your email. Emails should include your name and course information and be written in an appropriate tone; emails using "text-ese" or other inappropriate language and grammar will not be answered, nor will I reply to emails when it is not clear who I am talking to. Due to university policy, I will not discuss grades via email.

Reading: History is a study of the written word. Moreover, it is impossible to cover all the required material in the lectures. Therefore, it is imperative that you come to class prepared. That means reading the assigned material **before** class.

Technology: Cell phones and laptop computers can be useful tools. However, in the classroom they too often distract from rather than contribute to learning. Students found phoning, texting, chatting, social networking or playing games during class will be asked to leave class for the day. Further incidents may result in further penalties. If you are expecting an emergency message, please notify the instructor before class and handle the message discreetly. Lectures may not be taped or filmed without the permission of the instructor.

Late work: Late work or missed assignments may be completed only if the student has an official written excuse. All late work needs to completed within one week of the student's return to class.

Quizzes: We will have 4 quizzes over the course of the term on the dates listed on the calendar.

Papers: 3 papers will be assigned. Students are required to write two; if you write all three the third will count as extra-credit. They are due on the dates indicated on the calendar. They must be submitted via turnitin.com. Details for the assignments will be posted on Electronic Reserves at least one week before they are due.

No late papers will be accepted.

Exams: We will have 2 exams: a midterm and a final. The date for the midterm is posted on the calendar below; the date for the final will be announced when we get the finals schedule. The midterm exam will cover chapters 1-7; the final exam will cover chapters 8-14. The exams will consist of a number of essay questions.

Note – Once one student turns in an exam I will not pass out the exam to students who come late. Punctuality is important.

Map Quizzes: We will have two map quizzes in class during the term on the dates indicated below. Students will be given a blank US map and a list of geographic locations to correctly place on the map. A blank map and a list of the locations are posted on Electronic Reserves
