## **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES**

Welcome to Social Psychology! This course seeks to answer some of the most fundamental questions of social science, questions such as: 'Why do people do what they do? What are the unintended and intended consequences of these actions? Why do people act differently in the presence of other people than they would have individually? What is the nature and mechanism of social influence?' Social Psychologists have attempted to answer these fascinating questions with equally fascinating studies and experiments. In this course, you will be introduced to some of what social scientists have learned about how we behave and why. A lot of this will certainly challenge our own understanding of our selves and shed new light on sociological issues ranging from the micro world of personal relationships to the macro world of the global economy and international politics.

### **Quizzes/Assignments**

Throughout the semester I will give short quizzes and/or Assignments, usually consisting of multiple choice and/or fill in the blank questions. **Sometimes, these will be short writing assignments or problem solving exercises to be turned in at a later date.** Each quiz/assignments will be worth approximately 20 pts. You will take a total of 5 quizzes, for a total of 100 pts.

You may take each Quiz TWO TIMES. I will take the highest score. Quizzes are due on selected Sundays BY MIDNIGHT.

### <u>Exams</u>

Your total exam grade will be determined in one of two ways: 1) by equally weighting your midterm and final or by counting only the final exam. In the second case, the comprehensive final exam will count for 200 points, or 100% of your total grade, and the midterm will be disregarded. Final scores will be determined by the method of calculation that yields the highest score. **The final exam is comprehensive and will cover material going back to the beginning of the semester**. Students who therefore perform poorly on early examinations can compensate for their poor performance by performing well on the final. Students who score low on the final exam, by contrast, will (partially) offset their poor performance late in the semester by weighting all of their exam scores equally.
