

VALLEY STUDENTS AWARDED NOAA SCHOLARSHIPS

John Bell of Indianola and Kendra Thompson of Sledge, both sophomore computer science majors, have been awarded scholarships from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

The students have received appointments to the Educational Partnership Program's Class of 2011 Undergraduate Scholarship Recipients Program. Each will receive \$35,000 for academic assistance for two academic years beginning in fall 2011 through May or June 2013, along with two summer internships.

Dr. Constance Bland, the chair of the Mathematics and Computer Science Department shared the scholarship information with the students who also participate in the MVSU Student Support Services program.

The EPP Undergraduate Scholarship Program is in its 11th year of awarding scholarships. To date, NOAA has awarded 135 EPP Undergraduate Scholarship recipients with awards totaling approximately \$35,000 each. The two year scholarship is designed to increase the number of students who undertake course work and graduate with degrees in specific scientific areas or fields integral to NOAA's mission in critical science. Undergraduate college students receive training in oceanic and atmospheric science, research, technology, mathematics and engineering.

The \$35,000 scholarships will provide academic assistance (up to \$8,000) to John and Kendra for full-time study during each nine-month academic year and two 10-week, full-time internship positions (\$650/week) during the summer at a NOAA facility. The internships occur prior to the scholar's senior

year of the award and provide "hands-on research experience" in NOAArelated scientific, research, technological and policy activities. Awards also include a housing and travel expenses for attendance and participation at a mandatory Student Scholarship Orientation Program, conference travel and an end of the summer internship presentation at the Science and Education Symposium Program.

DAVID FLETCHER NAMED SIDLEY SCHOLAR

Mississippi Valley State University senior David Fletcher has been selected as a Sidley Prelaw Scholar, which includes a \$2,500 scholarship. Fletcher is the only student from Mississippi selected for the award.

The Sidley Prelaw Scholars Initiative is designed to increase diversity in law schools by subsidizing the cost of applying to law school for talented financially needy minority students.

"Sidley has a significant commitment to achieving greater ethnic and racial diversity within the legal profession and the firm. We wanted to develop a program that would widen the pipeline by helping to eliminate barriers at an

earlier stage in a student's career," said Thomas A. Cole, chairman of the firm's Executive Committee. "Our Diversity Committee and staff are to be congratulated for developing this creative approach."

"From my personal experience as a graduate of a historically black university, I know that there is a need for more financial assistance for students from historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) who are hopeful of obtaining professional degrees. We believe that the Sidley Prelaw Scholars Initiative will create opportunities for

graduates at HBCUs and for financially needy students from other institutions," said Stanley Stallworth. Stallworth is the firm-wide cochair of the firm's Diversity Committee, which is responsible for implementing the firm's policies and initiatives relating to diversity and inclusion.

In addition to the scholarship, the firm will pay for Fletcher's tuition for an approved LSAT preparatory course, registration fees for the upcoming LSAT and LSDAS and up to seven law school application fees and reports.

In addition, Fletcher will receive coaching on how to complete a successful law school application; and prelaw school instruction on the structure of the American legal system, as well as an introduction to the substance of the required common law first- year courses.

The primary goal of the conference is to further the participants' understanding of the United Nations and contemporary problems through experience-based learning opportunities. MVSU represented the Federal Republic of Equatorial Guinea in West Africa. "Our students will have the rare opportunity to build lasting and valuable relationships with delegates from all over the world, enhance their writing and oratory skills and meet with members of the diplomatic corps and ambassadors of the member countries of the United Nations," added Dr. Ero.

Over the years, delegates from the University have represented the countries of Angola, Swaziland, Nigeria and Cyprus.
