"The committee has been formed with nominations from the Faculty," said Dr. Baham. "We met Thursday and selected a recording secretary and established meeting dates. A report will be forthcoming as requested by the President."

In addition, Dr. Newman established the President's Council, a group comprised of the presidents of the Faculty Senate, Staff Council and Student Government Association. These individuals will meet monthly with the executive staff and the President to discuss issues and policies.

Also, a series of roundtable discussions with groups of faculty from across the campus will commence following Spring break, March 12-16. President Newman will listen to the concerns of the faculty during these discussions.

"I am open to discuss whatever concerns the faculty may have and look forward to working together to make MVSU a premiere educational institution," Newman said.

Coach James Green raises the nets in victory after the MVSU men's basketball team clinched the Southwestern Athletic Conference regular season championship after defeating the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff in the R.W. Harrison HPER Complex on March 2. The Delta Devils (16-14, 13-5 SWAC) were the top seed in the tournament; they won Wednesday's contest and will play tonight against Texas Southern in Birmingham. 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AARON HENRY LECTURE SERIES FEATURES BENJAMIN CHAVIS

Benjamin Chavis, president and CEO of Hip-Hop Summit Action Network, will be the featured speaker at the 2007 Aaron Henry Scholars Lecture Series on Race, Politics, Gender and Culture, sponsored by Mississippi Valley State University. The event is scheduled for Tuesday, March 20, at 6:30 p.m. in the H.G. Carpenter Auditorium.

Dr. Chavis will speak on "Hip-Hop, the Millennial Generation and Global Culture: What is the Future?"

Respondents are Dr. Beverly Guy-Sheftall, director of the Women's Research and Resource Center at Spelman College in Altanta; Bishop C. Garnett Henning Sr. of New Orleans, representative of the African Methodist Episcopal Church for Mississippi and Louisiana; and Dr. Mack Staton, assistant professor of English as Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C.

Serving as moderator will be Dr. Walter M. Kimbrough, president of Philander Smith College of Little Rock, Ark. Dr. Kimbrough is nationally recognized as an expert on historically Black fraternities and sororities.

When Russell Simmons established the Hip-Hop Summit Action Network (HSAN) to empower the Hip-Hop community to utilize their commanding cultural influence for freedom, justice and equality, he looked to Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, also known as Minister Benjamin Muhammad, who organized the historic New York Hip-Hop Summit in 2001. One month later, the HSAN was born and Dr. Chavis was named president and CEO.

HSAN is the largest and broadest national coalition of hip-hop artists, recording industry executives, youth activists and civil rights leaders. With the support of the major hip-hop labels, the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) and others, the HSAN has sponsored successful Hip-Hop Summits in New York, Kansas City, Oakland, Los Angeles, Miami, Seattle, Dallas and Washington, D.C.
