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MVSU students celebrate 71st Commencement with family, friends and cellphones

Valuable pearls of wisdom were not the only advice Mississippi Valley State University's 71st Commencement Speaker and alum Dr. Trina N. George gave to the 2023 graduates Saturday, May 6.

After telling them to always "thank those who encouraged you along the way," in an unusual move with President Jerryl Briggs, Sr.'s permission, Dr. George said, "I want all the graduates to take your phones out."

Both the graduates and audience uttered sounds around the R.W. Harrison Complex in awe of her request.

George, who is the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development State Director for Mississippi, explained. "I know we were supposed to have this commencement on the field but we had to bring it inside," she said. "So, some who would have been in attendance are not in here because

we don't have enough room ... I want you to call someone that's not in here right now who helped you through this journey. I want you to say: Thank you. I love you. We made it!"

The standing-room only audience exploded with various crowd-pleasing sounds as she gave the graduates two minutes to complete the calls.

One could see the excited graduates talking or texting on their phones. "I see you all. Call! This is your day!" George said.

According to her biography, "filled with a passion to serve her community, Dr. George has spent much of her career providing assistance to her fellow Mississippians and individuals nationwide."

Historically, she is the first woman and the first African American woman to be appointed to her current position in USDA Rural Development-Mississippi. (See more on her life and career on the mysu.edu website).



President Briggs presented Dr. George with a plaque of special appreciation. He also gave words of encouragement to the graduates.

Her speech and the ceremony drew positive reactions from attendees. "I thought the graduation was great, myself," said Rosie Moore of Memphis, Tenn.

Moore and her son Raymond Moore were there to support graduate

Kiara Love. "I think my little sister writes for the campus newspaper," said Raymond Moore to the Gazette.

"The graduation was a wonderful presentation; it was great!" he said.

MVSU News indicated that there were "230 undergraduate and 45 graduate students who crossed the stage to receive their degrees."

'Court on The Road' judges stress writing as a 'superpower!'

The Students of MVSU were granted an opportunity to be witnesses of the Judicial System this semester, as The Court of Appeals' Court on the Road program conducted a trial in the Carver A. Randle Auditorium in the Social Science Building.

The trial consisted of an oral argument concerning the case, Gilbert S. Macvaugh III v. The State of Mississippi, of which the verdict was reserved for a later date.

Once the trial concluded, students were permitted to ask the judges several questions concerning their experience and a career in law.

One of the things the judges consistently emphasized during a question-andanswer segment for the students was the importance of writing. "It's important for people, that if that their going into law school, that they major in English" said Judge Latrice A. Westbrooks, who presided over the trial.

She was accompanied by Judge David McCarty and Judge Debra McDonald in a three-judge panel.

McCarty concurred with Westbrooks assessment of the importance of writing and added: "The superpower in 2023 is writing. If you can communicate effectively through the written word, then that is how you're going to persuade people."

This event was a learning nexus for students in and outside of the political science major. The judges concurrently expressed that they hope the knowledge students gained by witnessing Court on the Road will carry onward into the foreseeable future.

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Rolling Fork's Mayor grateful for GMA's Robin Roberts' visit

More than 3 million ABC Network Good Morning America (GMA) viewers watched as Anchor Robin Roberts broadcast live from Rolling Fork, Miss. Wednesday, April 26.

In a special segment called "Mississippi Strong," Roberts, a Mississippi native, showed America the "resilience" of the citizens, one month after the EF-4 tornado struck and left horrific devastation in its path, including the loss of lives.

The Delta Devils Gazette spoke with Rolling Fork's Mayor Eldridge Walker about Roberts's visit. This is what he had to say: "It further made us feel how much people care about what's happening to our community. We appreciate GMA shining the light on our situation."

Walker, a native and the first African American mayor of the city said, one of his main priorities is making sure to keep up with the displaced families. "We must continue to make sure they are all right and to see what they need," he said. "We have families the Red Cross has put up in hotels around the Delta."

According to the MVSU Office of Student Affairs, there are six students enrolled from the Rolling Fork area and one from Silver City, a nearby community that was also impacted. There are also several from the Winona area. The Delta Devils Gazette did not get an opportunity to speak to those students regarding the tornado's impact.

Mayor Walker expressed appreciation for the supplies collected and donated by MVSU students and others. He said they are so grateful to everyone. "You all at Mississippi Valley, keep us lifted in your prayers," he said.

"The recovery may be a long process, but we are building back better."

Office of The International Programs hosted Diplomat-in-Residence J. Nathan Bland at MVSU to talk about the U.S. Department of State Careers that represents America to the World. His visits included class visits for student outreach, meeting with student leaders, faculty and administrators. During the class visits he discussed the U.S. Department of State paid internship programs for undergraduate students, Fellowships for recent graduates and Foreign Service Officers. Mr. Bland also talked about his journey to (and through) the U.S. Foreign Service so

Senior students were informed about the Thomas R. Pickering and Charles B. Rangel Fellowships that funds up to \$42,000 per year for two years to pursue Graduate programs. The fellowship also covers two paid internships in consecutive summers, one domestic and one abroad, and mentorship along the way. Anyone who is planning on attending graduate school next fall (Seniors/Alumni) are eligible to apply.

Bland is a career Foreign Service Officer with over fifteen years of experience in a wide variety of areas with the U.S. Department of State. As a Diplomat-in-Residence, he is responsible for recruiting candidates from diverse backgrounds for careers with the State Department. His most recent assignment was an Assistant General Services Officer at the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City serving as the Embassy's primary Contracting Officer and overseeing logistics for VIP visits. Prior to that, he was the Political, Economic and International

Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs (INL) Section Chief at the U.S. Embassy in Belmopan, Belize. He also served as the Public Affairs Officer at the U.S. Embassy to the Holy See, and a Consular Officer at the U.S. Consulate in Shenyang, China.



No tuition increase

In the state of Mississippi, most institutions of higher learning are headed toward tuition increases but not Mississippi Valley State University and Delta State University.

The announcement was released recently by the Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning (IHL).

According to reports, in the last two decades, there has been an increase in tuition within all eight universities, but Delta State University and Mississippi Valley State University are breaking that tradition this fall.

Students on the MVSU campus reacted with overwhelmingly positive feedback to this news.

"I feel that MVSU not increasing their tuition next year is good for the school and students," said Mikayla Etienne from Monroe, La. "I believe that it is good because most students have to take out student loans to pay for school already so if Valley continues to raise their prices the enrollment will drop because the people in closer areas wouldn't be able to afford it and just not attend school or go to a junior college."

Von Killins, an athlete at MVSU said that the decision to not raise tuition is excellent news for students like him who did not grow up with money. "The fact that not all students and families can afford college is one of the main arguments for making tuition at colleges free."

Ra'Daija Powell of Greenwood sees the no tuition increase as a win-win for "the Valley."

"The fact that Mississippi Valley State University won't be increasing tuition is amazing for students who are not on scholarship," Powell said. "This could help the enrollment rate go up at Mississippi Valley. It also gives students security [knowing] that Valley is here to help students receive an education without increasing tuition every year."
