### **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES**

This course is intended to introduce students to the core concepts, methods, and perspectives in sociological science. By mastering these skills, you will be able to: distinguish between your personal experience and scientific interpretations of evidence; become a more sophisticated and skeptical consumer of information, especially statistical evidence; better understand the ways in which people influence one another and the larger (intended and unintended) patterns and circumstances resulting from these influences; develop a better understanding of your 'self' in relation to others and a deeper awareness of your social surroundings; become a more informed and complete citizen; and finally, be able to take further courses in sociology.

# **GRADING SUMMARY (300 points)**

Rule: if your Final Exam score is higher than your midterm, I drop your midterm and count your final exam as 200 pts; if your midterm score is higher than your final exam score, each is worth 100 pts.

At the end of the course, all course points are added up and translated into the final letter grade that will appear on your transcript using the following key: A= 90- 100%. B= 89- 80%. C=79-70%. D = 69-60%. F= 59-0%

On rare occasions grades may be adjusted upward for improvement in exam performance over the course of the semester (if this improvement is both marked and consistent) or downward for disruptions to the learning environment (e.g. frequently wandering in to class late and out early, cell phone ringing, rudeness to fellow students).

## **Attendance and Participation**

Because this class meets only once a week, *your attendance is imperative!* Although your attendance does not factor into the calculation of your score, you are required to attend every class. Any student who has more than 3 unexcused absences will AUTOMATICALLY RECEIVE AN 'F' FOR THE COURSE. Students arriving late or leaving early will receive a half absence for that day. For example, you will fail this course if you are absent once and excessively tardy (arriving later than 15 minutes) twice. I expect all students to participate in class activities and will often require your participation in small group projects in order to receive attendance credit for that day.

### **Quizzes/Assignments**

Throughout the semester I will give short quizzes and/or Assignments, usually consisting of multiple choice and/or fill in the blank questions. **Sometimes, these will be short writing assignments or problem solving exercises to be turned in at a later date.** Each quiz/assignments will be worth approximately 20 pts. You will take a total of 5 quizzes, for a total of 100 pts.

### You may take each Quiz TWO TIMES. I will take the highest score.

### **Exams**

Your total exam grade will be determined in one of two ways: 1) by equally weighting your midterm and final or by counting only the final exam. In the second case, the comprehensive final exam will count for 200 points, or 100% of your total grade, and the midterm will be disregarded. Final scores will be determined by the method of calculation that yields the highest score. **The final exam is comprehensive and will cover material going back to the beginning of the semester**. Students who therefore perform poorly on early examinations can compensate for their poor performance by performing well on the final. Students who score low on the final exam, by contrast, will (partially) offset their poor performance late in the semester by weighting all of their exam scores equally.
