Catalog Course Description

An introductory course designed to familiarize students with substantive criminal law. The scope and sources of criminal law, essential elements of a crime, criminal liability, criminal responsibility and the capacity to commit a crime, defense, criminal punishment, criminal jurisdiction are some of the topics covered in the course.

Expected Student Learning Outcomes

This course is designed to acquaint students with:

- 1. Identify the essential elements of the American criminal law;
- 2. Provide the basic knowledge of the American criminal law;
- 3. Discuss important issues on the American criminal law.

Core Objectives of Criminal Justice Undergraduate Program

Upon completion of the undergraduate program the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of the structure, functions and principles of the main components of the criminal justice system law enforcement, courts, corrections, in addition to theories of crime and research methods.
- 2. Demonstrate ability to apply criminological principles to address "real life" criminal justice related problems.
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of research methods appropriate at the baccalaureate level.

I. Middle Semester Examination (25%)

II. Final Examination (30%)

This examination will consist of many multiple-choice questions that test your understanding of the contents in the required textbook and class discussions. No share of any material in any media during the exam. Each of you will independently take this examination.

III. Class Presentation & Term Paper (Total 5%)

- A. Each of you is assigned to present your term (class) paper and related issues (if any) for at least 5 minutes on the scheduled day in the syllabus (2.5%).
- B. Each of you is required to write a five-page term paper and to submit the term paper to the professor at jliu@mvsu.edu on the date as indicated in the Guidelines. The requirements of the class paper will be issued separately (2.5%).

IV. Class Participation (40%)

Class participation will be a combining product of reading textbook before class, attending class, raising substantial questions about the related issues, exercising practices, and submitting issued assignments during the class.
