Catalog Course Description

An introductory course designed to familiarize students with substantive criminal law. The scope and sources of criminal law, essential elements of a crime, criminal liability, criminal responsibility and the capacity to commit a crime, defense, criminal punishment, criminal jurisdiction are some of the topics covered in the course.

Core Objectives of Criminal Justice Undergraduate Program

Upon completion of the undergraduate program the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of the structure, functions and principles of the main components of the criminal justice system— law enforcement, courts, corrections, in addition to theories of crime and research methods.
- 2. Demonstrate ability to apply criminological principles to address "real life" criminal justice related problems.
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding of research methods appropriate at the baccalaureate level.

Grading Policy

The final grade will be determined by evaluating the following four parts:

- I. Mid Semester Examination (20%)
 - An in-class examination as Mid Semester Examination will be held in the first week of October 2018. This examination will consist of many multiple-choice questions that test students' understanding of the contents in the required textbook and class discussions. Each of you will independently take this examination.
- II. Final Examination (20%)
- III. Term Paper& Presentation (Total 20%)
 - 1. Each of you is assigned to present your term (class) paper and related issues (if any) for at least 10 minutes on the scheduled day in the syllabus (5%).
 - 2. Each of you is required to write a five-page term paper and to submit the term paper before your class presentation to the professor at alaba.oludare@mvsu.edu. The requirements of the class paper will be issued separately (15%).
- IV. Weekly Chapter / Case law Review (30%)

You are required to review the assigned chapter from the textbook, You will submit 2 pages review of the Chapter. There will be a total of 10 chapter reviews @ 2% each.

Additionally, each week one student will do a power point presentation on one chapter for 10%. The power point should have a minimum of 20 slides and must incorporate important issues and headings from the Text. You are responsible for only one power point in the semester.

V. Attendance & Class Participation (10%)

Class participation will be a combining product of attending class, raising substantial questions about the related issues, exercising practices, and submitting issued assignments during the class.

Grading Scale: 90 - 100% = A, 80 - 89% = B, 70 - 79% = C, 60 - 69% = D, Below 60% = F.
