Class Attendance Policy:	<p>Each student is required to participate in using Canvas Communication Tools, taking online exams, and other aspects of Canvas.</p> <p>You are expected to log in regularly (daily, perhaps several times per day) to submit assignments, check grades, personal messages, and view course materials.</p> <p>Student(s) who fail to participate in the online course during a course week will be deemed absent for that week. The absence will be annotated as <u>absent unexcused</u> (AU), unless the professor has been informed beforehand and deemed the absence as <u>absent excused</u> (AE). The professor shall report all absences to the main campus as required. A student who has not participated for 7 consecutive days regardless if the absences were deemed AU or AE shall be recommended for administrative withdrawal to the main campus. In a traditional classroom just because a student contacts the professor and is excused from a scheduled class meeting does not mean the student is given credit for participation or attendance. The student is still annotated as AU or AE. The online classroom shall be no different in this respect. It is the professor's sole discretion as to what he/she shall consider AU or AE.</p>

Topics, Guidelines, and Rubric for discussion essays will be issued separately.

The Rubric (Online Discussion Rubric) is applied for all discussion essays.

Interactive discussions may not be bound by the Rubric but should be clear at least without grammar, spelling, or typing errors.

Do NOT submit interactive discussion as an attached file.

2. QUIZZES

All quizzes consist of multiple choice questions.

Be certain to read ALL pertinent materials prior to taking quizzes. Not doing so will certainly lead to disappointing results.

3. RESEARCH PAPER

Submit Research Paper as an attached file.

Students are required to write a research paper on a topic addressing issues concerning **terrorism**. The paper should fully discuss the issue or topic to the comprehension of a lay person.

Guidelines & Topics of Research Paper will be issued separately.

The paper is to follow the APA style. For information on APA style, consult:

The research paper must consist of a minimum of 10 different citations from at least 6 different hard-copied academic journals and/or research books in the APA format. It must be **10 double-spaced pages**.
