The absence will be annotated as absent unexcused (AU), unless the professor has been informed beforehand and deemed the absence as absent excused (AE). The professor shall report all absences to the main campus as required. A student who has not participated for 7 consecutive days regardless if the absences were deemed AU or AE shall be recommended for administrative withdrawal to the main campus. In a traditional classroom just because a student contacts the professor and is excused from a scheduled class meeting does not mean the student is given credit for participation or attendance. The student is still annotated as AU or AE. The online classroom shall be no different in this respect. It is the professor's sole discretion as to what he/she shall consider AU or AE.

Submit Research Proposal as an attached file.
