ACTING PRESIDENT'S VISION FOR MVSU: KEEP MOVING FORWARD

Dr. Jerryl Briggs has a vision for Mississippi Valley State University and that is to keep the institution moving forward.

Briggs has adopted the phrase, 'Valley in Motion' from the universities health and wellness campaign to promote the gains the institution has made and will make in the future.

"To me that means having the vision that we are still moving. We want to put things in place that show our successes and keep us on the forefront. The vision for me is to make sure we are recognized as that great institution we know we are not just in this community, but in the higher education landscape as a whole," said Briggs.

"I have taken the phrase, 'Valley in Motion' from our health campaign with the Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation."

On June 15th the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning named Briggs



as Acting President of MVSU. Briggs previously served as executive vice president and chief operating officer at the University.

Dr. Briggs earned his Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry education from Xavier University of

Louisiana, his Master of Arts degree in human relations and supervision from Louisiana Tech University, and both an Educational Specialist degree in higher education administration and doctorate in educational policy, planning and leadership from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va. He also completed Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management program.

"I have continued to say that we want to continue on the momentum, growth and sustainability that we have experienced and will continue to experience," said Briggs. Things have been put in place here that have been successful so there's no need to start the book over," he added.

Through the first month of his role as acting president, Briggs said, "so far, so good."

The New Orleans native has over 25 years of professional experience in higher education administration. Before joining Mississippi Valley State University, he served as vice president for student affairs and enrollment management at Central State University in Ohio.

Prior to Central State University he has held various positions within higher education administration, including serving for ten years at Lincoln University (PA) as vice president for student affairs and enrollment management, and dean of students.


ZHENG PUBLISHES FIFTH EDITED BOOK

Dr. John Zheng, chair and professor of English at Mississippi Valley State University, has published his fifth edited book, Sonia Sanchez's Poetic Spirit through Haiku, in June 2017 with Lexington Books. This collection of ten critical essays is the first scholarly criticism of haiku by Sonia Sanchez, who has exemplified herself for six decades as a major figure in the Black Arts Movement, a central activist in civil rights and women's movements, and an internationallyknown writer in American literature. Sanchez's haiku, as an integral and prominent part of contemporary African American poetry, have expressed not only her ideas of nature, beauty, and harmony but also her aesthetic experience of music, culture, and love. Aesthetically, this experience reflects a poetic mind which has helped the poet to shape or reimage her poetic spirit.

William Ferris, distinguished professor at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

and author of Give My Poor Heart Ease: Voices of the Mississippi Blues states that "Sonia Sanchez's Poetic Spirit through Haiku

explores how Sonia Sanchez used haiku to empower her voice within the Black Arts Movement. The volume's editor John Zheng explains that Sanchez expressed herself as "a protest poet, a fighter, and a revolutionary" through haiku, a poetic form that originated Japanese as court poetry. Zheng notes that Sanchez, like Richard Wright, embraced haiku as a comfortable, familiar poetic structure. John

the reader a fascinating new perspective on both writers."

Philip C. Kolin, distinguished scholar on Tennessee Williams and editor of Southern Quarterly at University Mississippi of Southern says that "John Zheng has a distinguished assembled group of contributors to study Sonia Sanchez's haiku in a volume that needs to be read and savored. The essays, plus Zheng's masterful introduction and own contribution, discuss such powerful topics as the

WALKER ANNOUCES NEW WOMEN'S **BASKETBALL COACHING STAFF**

Mississippi Valley State women's basketball head coach Ashley Walker announced Josh Cooperwood and Joi Walker as assistant coaches for the Mississippi Valley State women's basketball program.

Josh Cooperwood joins the Mississippi Valley State University women's basketball staff as an assistant coach after serving in the same capacity at North Carolina Central University.

Prior to his arrival at NCCU, Cooperwood spent five years serving his alma mater; Tennessee State University, where he worked with the women's basketball program. During his first year on the staff (2011-2012), he

served as the Director of Basketball Operations. In 2015, the Lady Tigers won the 2015 Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, during that time Cooperwood was serving as an assistant coach and the recruiting coordinator.

He was also responsible for recruiting All-OVC players: Chelsea Hudson (2015), Imani Davis (2016), Javda Johnson (2016) and Brianna Lawrence (2016). Lawrence was also named the

2015 OVC Tournament MVP. Cooperwood served as the defensive coordinator, which involved creating the defensive strategy for each opponent. Under his supervision, the team tallied an overall grade point average of 3.2 and a 100 percent graduation rate during his time at TSU.

Cooperwood's collegiate career at Tennessee State was highlighted by a 2003 All-OVC Second team selection and a career high 32-points against #7 University of Kentucky (Wildcats). While enrolled as a student-athlete at Chattanooga State Community College, Cooperwood was named to the 2001 TJCAA First team, 2001 TJCAA Player of the Year and a 2001 NJCAA All-American.

He played professionally for eight years (2003-2011). While many dream of traveling extensively, Cooperwood had the opportunity to live that dream and play the game he loves. He played in the Euroleague, which took him to Windsor Drive (Canada), Maccabbi Netanya (Israel), Antranik Club (Lebanon), Union Zacatecas (Mexico), Arena Club (Jordan), SL IAT Leotar (Croatia), Sporting Club (Kuwait) and Saba Caspian Mehr (Iran).

A native of Nashville, Cooperwood graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Liberal Arts from Tennessee State and holds an Associate of Science degree in Communications from Chattanooga State Community College.

Cooperwood is a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and is the father of two, Amiyah and Joshua, Jr.



"I am extremely excited to have Josh on staff. He comes to us from North Carolina Central, which is in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC). Prior to NCCU, he worked in the OVC at his Alma Mater, Tennessee State. Josh also

played overseas, so his knowledge and passion for the game is immense. With Josh being from the Nashville area, he will be able to assist with bringing high school students to Mississippi Valley," said Coach A. Walker.

Joi Walker joins the Mississippi Valley State University women's basketball program after two years as an assistant coach at Moberly Area Community College, having previously served as a volunteer assistant coach at Harris Stowe State University in St. Louis during the 2011-2012 season.

TWO MVSU PLAYERS SELECTED FOR NBPA TOP 50 CAMP

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — The list of players from each institution has been finalized in anticipation the National Basketball of Players Association (NBPA) and Historically Black Colleges and

Universities (HBCU) Top 50 Basketball Camp, will take place, July 20-22 at the Clark Atlanta University Center in Atlanta, GA.

Isaac Williams, 6-4, 181-pound, guard from Lake Charles, La. along with Marcus Romain, 6-2, 174-pound guard from Brooklyn, N.Y. have been chosen for the camp.

The NBPA, in conjunction with the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC), and the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) will hold the inaugural camp, which



will feature 25 of the best players from each conference. Modeled after the NBPA's Top 100 Camp, players will receive skill development sessions on the court from current and retired NBA

players and participate in leadership and life skills development sessions off the court.

The list of potential coaches for the event with a NBA playing career background includes New York Knicks forward Kyle O'Quinn (Norfolk State alum), Philadelphia 76ers forward Robert Covington (Tennessee State alum), Utah Jazz forward Derrick Favors (Atlanta native), former Atlanta Hawk guard Gary Neal, Chicago Bulls guard Anthony Morrow, Utah Jazz guard Shelvin Mack and retired 12-year NBA veteran George Lynch.



With his background in enrollment management, Briggs has been vocal about the push to increase enrollment with it being the institutions primary goal.

"We have been able to have enrollment growth over the past three years and we want that trend to continue. Although the work of recruiting is coordinated in one office it ultimately is everyone's responsibility," said Briggs.

"It is everyone's job to speak positively about the university to ensure that as we are talking to potential students they understand the good things happening at the university," said Briggs.

In addition to Valley, Central State and Lincoln University, Briggs has also held positions at Clark Atlanta University, the College of William and Mary, Georgia Institute of Technology and the University of Illinois-Urbana/Champaign. Briggs is also a former military man having served six years in the Marines reserves stationed in New Orleans.

As a child Briggs enjoyed many things, but one thing he loved a great deal was music.

"I played the French horn from the sixth grade to college. I also played the mellophone in high school," said Briggs.

Although Briggs grew up in New Orleans, he was born in Chicago and moved to the south when he was between five and six-years-old.

Briggs said his passion is higher education and he has known that most of his adult life.

"I am a prime example of having your life focus around higher education. Once I found out what my true calling was after graduating college I started to work in it. I have never had a professional job outside of the university environment and it has been a blessing to me," said Briggs.

MY VALLEY STORY: VALLEY'S IMPACT ON FAIR IS GREAT

In 2001, when Bradford Fair, '05 crossed the graduation stage of Clarksdale High School he knew without a shadow of a doubt where he would attend college.

Mississippi Valley State University was the place for him, much like it had been for his brother Byron, and their father, Marshall, who attended the university when it was known as Mississippi Vocational College.

"Valley was the place for me. I wanted to be at an HBCU and I wanted to be close to home. That narrowed the search to a very small number of one," said Fair.

From Valley, Fair received a full band scholarship that he maintained and allowed him to march in the band for four years, he served as Mr. MCIS (Mathematics, Computer and Information Sciences) his freshman year and also became a part of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.

Because he is skilled in piano, percussion and organ he was able to serve as the pianist for the MVSU Jazz Band. He also performed at events which featured B.B. King, Isaac Hayes, Coretta Scott King, Vanessa Bell Armstrong, as well as other notable university events.

"Being here at Mississippi Valley was special for me," said Fair. "I thrived and became the man I am today. The professors and the family atmosphere at The Valley is second to none."

After graduating from MVSU with a bachelor of science degree in computer science, Fair

Fair has brought to the Clarksdale area national recording artist Marvin Sapp, Tamela & David Mann also known as Cora and Brown from Tyler Perry's Meet the Browns, Rance Allen, Tyga Graham who played Bobby in Tyler Perry's I Can Do Bad All By Myself and the Gospel recording quartet, The Walls Group.

"It is my desire to continue to plant good seeds in the good ground of Clarksdale much like Mississippi Valley State planted good seeds into me."
