Course Description:

This course is a study of the world literary masterpieces. It encompasses the developments and masterpieces of the world's literary expression from the Ancient World to the early Modern Period (the Renaissance)..

Expected Student Learning Outcomes:

To recognize the cultural changes from The Ancient World through The Early Modern Period. To demonstrate writing skills using standard American English. To identify different genres of literature.

Required Text and Other Recommended Materials:

Damrosch, David, gen. ed. Gateways to World Literature, Volune 1. Boston: Pearson, 2012.

Class Attendance Policy:

Timely, regular attendance is required. For a three credit course which meets three times weekly, five (5) unexcused absences are allowed. Each subsequent absence causes the grade to drop one letter grade until the accumulated unexcused absences constitute failure. Three tardy arrivals constitute one (1) absence. If you enter the class after your name has been called, it is your responsibility to inform me immediately after class that you were present. Otherwise, this error on your part will remain. Furthermore, if you miss as much as two-thirds of a class by arriving late and/or leaving early, you will be marked absent, even if you are present during roll call. Absences are counted from the first day of class until the end of the semester. Only official University excused absences will be accepted as **excused absences**. Reading quizzes or vocabulary checks may be given at the start of class. If you arrive in class during or after quizzes have been given, you will not be allowed to make up the quiz.

Each assignment will have a due date and will be closed after that, which means you cannot make up work.

Cheating and Plagiarism Policy:

Plagiarism is the deliberate submission of someone else's work as your own. When a faculty member responsible for a course has reason to believe that an action of a student falls within the aforementioned definition, the faculty member should initiate a conference with the student to present the student with the charge and the evidence. If the evidence is conclusive, the instructor has the prerogative of assigning a grade of "0" or "F" for the work submitted, assigning a "F" for the entire course, or recommending another penalty, including dismissal from the University.
