"We were influenced by teachers we had at Valley that had patience understanding and kindness, and we wanted to exemplify those same characteristics in our careers," Walker said. "We advise current students to prepare for the future. Stay the course have a plan to achieve their goals, work hard and trust God!"

Approaching graduation each year, the MVSU Office of Alumni Affairs invites members of the class who graduated from the university 50 years prior to a celebratory reunion, which includes a Golden Gala and participation in the commencement to receive their Golden Diploma.

During the May 3, 2024, Golden Gala, the Class of 1974 Golden Graduates presented a generous donation to MVSU.

The Mississippi Valley State University Office of Faculty Development held an Artificial Intelligence (AI) workshop in April to provide faculty members with insight into the use of AI in education and research.

Al Smith of Purpix Education presented the workshop titled, "Advancing Higher Education with AI." Smith designed his presentation as an easy-to-learn, hands-on activity that equipped faculty with the "knowledge, skills and practical strategies necessary to seamlessly integrate AI into the curriculum."

Participants became excited when Smith engaged them in an exercise

that showed them how AI can write or compose their student learning outcomes (SLOs). He said, all the educators will have to do is tweak the SLOs according to what they will teach.

Several faculty members expressed that the workshop helped them to have a more open mind about AI use in the classroom. They each received certificates after participating in the two-hour professional development session.

According to Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Abigail Newsome's updates during a later full faculty senate meeting, there will be more AI workshops, seminars, and technology training.




























Spring Stole Ceremony 2024: Athletes reflect on their time at 'The Valley'


