"Nothing matters but the facts. Without them, the science of criminal investigation is nothing more than a guessing game." This famous quote written by Blake Edwards has proven itself to be true!

On October 3-5, the Ida B. Wells Society hosted its OSINT Boot Camp at WSB-TV news station in Atlanta, Ga. Amongst the 10 selected students were yours truly, MVSU's very own Editor-In-Chief, Amber E. Stewart. The boot camp began at 9 a.m., Thursday morning, and it was spearheaded by Kevin Reyes, adjunct instructor at USC Annenberg in Los Angeles, Calif.

Some may wonder, just what is ONSIT? Well, ONSIT is Open-Source Intelligence. What do ONSIT do? "ONSIT gathers information that is accessible through digital means-such as websites, social media, emails, text messages, public records, satellite imagery, and the deep web." ONSIT provided this three-day training to selected students and reporters that provided the trainees with much-needed advanced tools that can help strengthen their reports and investigations.

Each topic that Kevin focused on was explained in great detail, and he also gave each participant the opportunity to see how investigative journalists find their answers and prove them by utilizing open-sources. Some sites are common amongst us, and we utilize them on a day-to-day basis, such as: Google (imagery search), social media (Facebook, Instagram, etc.), and Bing, can be utilized in some cases.

Kevin also targeted subjects such as geo-locating, website and domain forensics, social media and flight data and chronolocation. With the use of

the Internet, Kevin trained us on how to use opensource websites to dig up some of the most hidden information. When gathering information, it imperative that journalists/

reporters are precise and clear and how they can prove it to be true.

One case that we touch based on was the famous case, Hermes v. Rothschild. We had to take the case on as our own and figure out who's who. With the limited information provided, our task was to identify and prove that Mason Rothschild was the person behind the business. ## FACULTY CORNER 'Show up and try' is Holman's directive to students





#### MVSU professors present 'interesting' research at Advancing Mississippi Conference

JACKSON, Miss. — Three professors from Mississippi Valley State University (MVSU) pre-sented their research paper at the 9th Annual Advancing Mississippi

Conference on Sept. 27 at the Research and Education Center. Conference attendees were welcome by Commissioner of Higher Education Al Rankins.



Advancing The Mississippi Conference is a unique opportunity to contribute to a brighter future for Mississippi's citizens, according to Coordinator and Senior Economist Dr. Sondra Collins of the University Research Center at the Mississippi Institutions of

Learning (IHL).

The professors' paper titled, "Post-Secondary Education in Prisons in Mississippi: Prospects and Challenges", focuses on the importance of postsecondary education for incarcerated individuals in the state.

This research is based on data collected from MVSU's Prison Educational Partnership Program (PEPP), which has offered courses for three bachelor's degree programs at two correctional facilities in the Mississippi Delta since 2020.

The abstract of the study highlights that post-secondary education in prisons



aims to improve the skills and employability of justice-impacted individuals, ultimately reducing recidivism rates in Mississippi. It discusses the benefits

and drawbacks of providing educational opportunities in correctional facilities and evaluates the transformative impact



on individuals, families, and communities. The research argues for state investment in education, training, and reentry programs for incarcerated individuals.

The Delta Devils will be led by dualthreat quarterback Ty'Jarian Williams, who has shown his ability to make plays both on the ground and through



the air. Williams has been a consistent force for MVSU, but the team will need to rally after losing top wide receiver Kerrick Ross to an injury in their earlier game. Ross, who caught a 20-yard touchdown pass earlier in the season, has been one of the team's most reliable offensive weapons.

Bethune-Cookman is in a comparable situation, with their offense struggling to find consistency. Both teams will be looking for a breakthrough to salvage momentum for the rest of the season.

In a battle of winless teams, Mississippi Valley State is poised to

secure its first victory of the season over Bethune-Cookman. Led by quarterback Williams, MVSU has shown flashes of offensive potential, and with their backs against the wall, the Delta Devils are likely to come out strong at home. The loss of wide receiver Ross to injury may slow their passing attack, but Williams' ability to move the ball on the ground could open opportunities against Bethune-Cookman's vulnerable defense.

On the defensive side, MVSU has shown resilience, and if they can



and limit mistakes, the Delta Devils should be able to control the tempo and secure a 24-17 win. Playing on their new turf and in front of their home crowd could provide the extra boost they need to end their six-game losing streak and send the fans onto the yard to celebrate a homecoming victory.
