Catalog Course Description: (3 credit hrs)

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the field of social psychology using a sociological perspective. Students who develop a good grasp of the materials presented in this course should be able to understand some of the basic components underlying the behaviors and mental processes of people involved in social interaction and the methods used by sociologists to construct these theories.

Purpose/Overview:

Although the psychological perspective cannot be ignored; this course will focus primarily on the Sociological perspective and the work of Sociologists. The symbolic interaction of persons and systems will be a major focus of the discussions. This course investigates the mental processes, situational factors, individual differences, and group phenomena that influence the way humans interact with each other, i.e., self and others.

Course Outcomes and Learning Objectives:

In this course, students should develop an understanding/ appreciation of cultural diversity and be able to apply Sociological concepts and critical thinking in short writing assignments and active real life situations.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of theories, issues and research relevant to the study of social psychology, using a sociological perspective.
- Critically examine social processes and interactions in everyday life.
- Apply the tools for independent critical analysis, integration, and creative expression through classroom exercises.
- Critically examine and prepare for the roles humans play within the social structure.
- Participate in experiential learning and practice the skills of Applied sociology.
- Engage in discourse with peers in a respectful manner, creating a safe and healthy environment in which to express diverse perspectives.

Course Format/ Activities: Class meetings will be organized on a lecture/discussion basis with activities, including films, videos, guest speakers, group discussions, homework assignments and student presentations. Mini Projects, based on small group and individual active learning which integrate theory with experiential learning are a major component of the curriculum. Project guidelines will be provided in Wk 6.

Course Requirements:

The textbook is required. Students are required to complete all assigned reading and written assignments before class and be thoroughly prepared to engage in discussion/sl. We will not be reading the text book in class. Consistent and thorough preparation is essential to successful completion of this course. This is an academic course and a learning environment, not a talk show. At first you may not understand the concepts; a second reading will be most helpful. Even if you do not fully grasp the material, if you have made a reasonable attempt to read, that will be evident. Students must observe all rules of courtesy and respect, when participating in discussions. **Popular magazines and talk shows are not scholarly sources.**

Film Scene Analysis

The study of Social psychology incorporates several theoretical frameworks of analysis, including social deconstruction and critical conflict. The social structure and how we interpret our interactions are critical to understanding social behavior. In these assignments, you will practice observing, describing, and analyzing movie scenes, using select theories.

Exam/s: may consist of a combination of multiple choice, true- false, matching, listing, and essays. Test questions will come from lecture, textbook, videos, and any handouts which you have received.

Important Note: All papers must be typed, double-spaced with one inch margins, maximum 12 point. A well-written paper successfully conveys your message. Poor grammar, sentence construction, organization, or spelling errors often makes it difficult for your instructor to understand your intended message and could also affect your grade. Any paper requirement violations will result in 0 for that assignment and a possible "F" in the course. **Assignments are due at 2:25 p.m on Thursday/s. No late submissions will be accepted.**

Academic Integrity: All of my classes are held to very high standards of academic integrity. All acts of academic dishonesty, including, but not limited to, cheating on exams, plagiarism, internet papers, presenting someone else's work as your own, failing to meet academic and professional requirements, will result in an automatic "F."
